DOT... CLIMATE CHANGE IS REAL!

Rustenburg – A group of Grade seven learners at Sunrise View Primary School in Rustenburg recently engaged on a skype-discussion with Marion C. Moore School learners in Louisville, Kentucky (USA), on the hot topic of climate change. The project is a collaboration between the North West University and the University of Louisville. It aims to empower schools in a participatory manner to identify problems in their communities related to climate change, forge partnerships and find solutions for community challenges from grassroots level. Educators Leonard Marimbe and Granny Malatji, backed by their principal Lesego Lorraine Modise, were able to make real-life curriculum links with climate change. The schools each constructed its own 'do one thing' (DOT) community tree to give insight into the collective mind of the community. This activity provides the opportunity to discuss the important, but often misunderstood concept of climate change and empowers learners to be citizen-scientists.
